Dear Community Supporter,

If 2020 was a year of transition, 2021 was a year of learning how to adjust, cope, and integrate the changes that the previous year brought. This is true of the survivors and significant others MCRCC serves, and for our staff who support survivors and significant others through the collective trauma of the global COVID-19 pandemic.

This is evident in the increase in the number of individual counseling sessions provided to MCRCC clients in 2021. In 2020, MCRCC provided about 17 individual counseling sessions per client, and in 2021 that number increased to 30 sessions per client. MCRCC's Crisis Intervention Team provided 15% more services in 2021 than in 2020.

It was with consideration for MCRCC clients and staff that we began looking for a new ADA compliant office space in Salinas with renewed passion. We found our perfect forever home in downtown Salinas at the end of 2021. We will be welcoming clients and community partners to our new space very soon!

I want to express my deepest gratitude to MCRCC staff, volunteers, and board members for dedicating a significant part of their lives to the fulfillment of our mission; MCRCC clients, students, and community for trusting MCRCC to do our important work; and to MCRCC funders and donors for ensuring that our work continues well into the future.



New helpline technology


In May 2021, MCRCC transitioned to a new helpline software.

The automated helpline software:


- Allows callers to select English or Spanish.
- Reduces call wait times.
- Continues to protect the anonymity and confidentiality of callers.
- Generates instant reports.
- Allows for instant schedule changes for the staff and volunteers who cover the line.
- Identifies call trends.
- Aids in burn-out prevention.
- Increases the safety of staff and volunteers with prank caller protocols.


The Monterey County Rape Crisis Center offers trauma-informed therapy for adults and children, using evidence-based modalities.



Campus

MCRCC and CSUMB collaborate to ensure that students, faculty, and staff are supported by a full-time Campus Advocacy Program Manager. Lorelei Ahlemeyer began as MCRCC's Campus Advocacy Program Manager at CSUMB in 2018.

Lorelei earned the Advisor of The Year Award at CSUMB in the spring of 2021. The award is issued by the Multicultural Greek Council, and is given to an advisor whom students nominate for being supportive and involved in their organizations.

In 2021, MCRCC facilitated 49 outreach and awareness presentations and events on campus; and provided 65 CSUMB survivors and significant others with 631 crisis intervention, advocacy, accompaniment, and counseling services.

PREA

MCRCC recognizes that sexual violence within incarceration is a nationwide epidemic. There are a number of detention facilities in Monterey County including the California Training Facility, Salinas Valley State Prison, the Monterey County Jail, Monterey County Juvenile, and the Monterey County Youth Detention Center.

MCRCC has a dedicated Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) Program Manager, Carl Mucha, who provides crisis intervention, advocacy, and accompaniment services via letter writing correspondence, phone calls, and in-person support to incarcerated survivors in Monterey County and throughout the state as people within the California Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections system are often moved from facility to facility for the duration of their sentence. In 2021, MCRCC provided 72 survivors experiencing incarceration and significant others with 578 services.

Human trafficking

Survivors of human trafficking deserve empathy, compassion, and understanding. All MCRCC staff are trained in providing services to human trafficking survivors. MCRCC employs a full-time Human Trafficking Outreach Specialist, Rita Mora. Rita provides both direct services to survivors and human trafficking-specific trainings and presentations to the public, student groups, and service providing organizations.

In 2021, MCRCC facilitated 13 human trafficking outreach and awareness presentations and provided 28 human trafficking survivors and significant others with 111 crisis intervention, advocacy, accompaniment, and counseling services.
